Staying the Course

What awaits the world in 2023 is anyone's prediction. We started
2022 with world-wide COVID concerns and economies suffering. At the

end of 2022, COVID remained a concern while governments worked to mitigate its impact. Within Redeemer Lutheran Church (RLC) our in-person worship experience gained some traction and attendance, and others continued to worship online. How can we not help but stay the course in 2023?

During the year, Russia declared war on Ukraine. Surprisingly to Russia, the Ukrainian people, with help from countries around the world have valiantly fought to keep Ukraine for the Ukrainians. When watching the nightly news, it is easy to fall into a belief that nothing good exists in our society these days; not true.

RLC as a congregation continued its global support with specific contributions to some agencies and through Canadian Lutheran World Relief. Locally, we have a kindred spirit who keeps us abreast with the needs and experiences at Father Vachon School. The Food Bank donations gathered in November and December filled the back of a Sienna van! I know the donations were gratefully received as when the available staff showed up to carry many loads into the building words to the effect that "Oh boy, you guys brought a lot of stuff" were heard. Merry Christmas from RLC was all that we needed to say before driving off into a snowy blustery day.

Where does staying the course take us? The writers of the letters to the Hebrews may have some insights for us. In Chapter 12 at verses 1 and 2 from the English Standard Version states:

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.

God has shown us the way. Do not be overwhelmed with negativity that may come your way. A few years ago, the "paying it forward" movement generated much interest. If you are looking for a course to chart each day, try paying it forward to someone you know or maybe even a stranger.

Trust that the Lord will guide our leaders, at every level, to make the right decisions. Remember that even the smallest pebble dropped into a pond of water causes ripples throughout that pond. All of us have a compass to chart a course that makes a difference in our lives and the greater community. Together, let us chart that course through the challenges of 2023.



The unaudited financial statements and trends for 2022 show that we had a surplus of \$15,162.03 before the fund account revenues and expenses. The surplus for December was \$7,568.71. The envelope giving for 2022 was \$303,346.02, about \$21,000 more than budgeted. Thank you to everyone who had so generously contributed to Redeemer's operations throughout 2022. Audited financial state-

ments for 2022 will be presented at the next annual general congregational meeting.

The unaudited financial statements also show the amounts and the agencies that members had contributed to throughout the year. A total of \$16,154 was donated by members to agencies such as CLWR, LuMinHoS, the Salvation Army, the Saskatoon Food Bank and others.

An offering plate is located at the top of the stairs in the sanctuary for you to drop off your donation as you enter or exit the church service. In addition, the following options are available for you to make a donation:

1. Mail to or drop off a cheque at the church

2. Interac E-Transfer using online banking

We are set up for automatic deposit. If you use online banking, you may make a payment to Redeemer Lutheran Church by:

i. Logging into your personal banking account, add Redeemer Lutheran Church as a recipient using the email address redeemer.luth.stoon@sasktel.net

iii. You should follow up with an email to Becky at <u>redeemer.luth.stoon@sasktel.net</u> advising her of your donation.

3. Monthly PAD donation

You may request to sign up for a monthly **Pre-Authorized Debit (PAD)** donation. This option allows you to automatically make your donation monthly by allowing the church to debit your account for the donation. Please contact the church office if you would like to take advantage of this giving option.

Please note that you may **donate marketable securities** to the church. This will allow you to eliminate any capital gains taxes and allow you a tax donation credit at the same time.
