What is Lent?

Lent marks the forty days leading up to Easter, mirroring the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness. It is a practice that began during the 4th century as a way to prepare Christians for the holiest days of the year.

During Lent, we ask God to show us the world as it is. We begin with the reality of our finitude rubbed on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday— from dust we were made, to dust we shall return. Then, we walk through that reality in a kind of dress rehearsal. It's the downward slope of God—the Great Descent, where the whole Church walks toward the cross.

Frankly, Lent is my favorite part of the church calendar because it is a time when the whole church is on the losing team. A time when we all get a minute to tell the truth: Life is so beautiful and life is so hard. For everyone.

Of course, the cross isn't the end of the story, but this season of grief is carved out to acknowledge the reality of Christ's sacrifice. And the reality of suffering that so many of our circumstances reflect too—our own pain and grief and despair. Easter is coming, yes. But for now, we sit in the ashes of our broken dreams and broken hearts, knowing that God sits here with us.

Many people practice Lent by giving something up—alcohol, meat, chocolate, social media. Some take up something new—a new prayer practice or swearing profusely like I did one year (you probably remember reading about this in Everything Happens for a Reason (and Other Lies I've Loved)).

But Lent is an incredible moment for the spiritual honesty we are practicing here. Together, we're going to bless the days we have, while longing for the future God promised when there will be no tears, no pain, no email.

Kajsa Felstrom and 7 other fourth-year nursing students have been placed at Nutana Collegiate, where many students face inadequate housing, and food insecurity. They are currently supporting approximately 75 Afghan students with food, household items and income assistance.

To do this, they have been holding weekly food markets, where the students can pick up free groceries to take home for the week. For household supplies, they will be hosting a household market on March 14th, where the students can take home any supplies they need. Listed below are items the students have requested, however, they would be happy to accept any food or household items to support them.

There is a bin in the Place of Welcome to collect food items. Smaller household items may be brought to church and left on the table just before you enter the Fireside Lounge from the Place of Welcome. 

How does four months pass so quickly? Advised by Ed Miller, Chair of Stewardship Committee it's my turn to write a message for Redeemer Happenings, Redeemer's monthly newsletter.

A Way of Life

I begin to search frantically for something that would be interesting, focused on stewardship and capture the interest of our members. The Bible is always a great place to start. As I thumb through it Luke 19: 12-27 is underlined. The religious idea of stewardship is that everything belongs to God and we are permitted to use it while here on earth.

If I were in a physical situation where I needed long term care for my physical needs and still had cognitive skills would I continue to be a steward of Christ using my remaining abilities and skills in his service or would I become so filled with unhappiness that I would not share Christ's love in service nor in prayer.

It's Valentines Day. I visit a dear friend who is forced to reside in Parkridge Center relegated to bed or wheel chair. Her physical limitations cannot be accommodated in most care homes so Parkridge is her permanent home. She invites me to accompany her to the Valentines Day social to be held in the activities room. On the way we meet several residents— all of whom she calls by name and makes introductions. Most all we meet are in motorized wheel chairs or scooters and all have little or no capacity to acknowledge the introduction. Not to be deterred she greets and treats each person with respect and kindness. People respond with a smile or nod or vacant stare and we pass on by. I have to ask myself if I were Meg would I be able to day after day make an introduction with such respect and warmth. Over and over again? This is a demonstration of love. I have been introduced to residents many times previously and with shame I must admit I do not remember their names.

In the activities room a young woman, mute and seemingly paralyzed, manages a motorized scooter by means of a couple of fingers on a "stick". Young with beautiful dark eyes she gives Meg an adoring smile. Meg asks if her neck needs a massage. Her eyes affirm the need. Meg reaches out with a hand she can use and massages her upper back and neck muscles. A radiant smile means " thank you"; precious and intimate moments of sharing!

Back in Meg's room Meg shows me some of her paintings—portraits of staff many not yet complete. When complete the portraits will be offered to staff as a thank you for caring for people in Parkridge Center. She completes water colours and pencil sketches—all of which she gives away. She says art classes taken on line help her to maintain her sanity and her sense of purpose. Art projects challenge her and make her life worth living.

Question? If I were in Meg's situation would I have the generosity, interest, endurance and love of people —enough to be motivated to care for others.? Would I be a steward sharing Christ's love with others?

Meg is writing a book with the purpose of improving health care—primarily care at Parkridge Center. She is in the process of finding a publisher and hopes sales are sufficient to repair the swimming pool at Parkridge Center and make it functional for residents.

My friend Meg believes she must speak for people in Parkridge who have no voice. She is their steward. This poem is a summary statement about the needs of residents to have their voices heard.

Coming Home

I am a survivor I AM AN INNOCENT CHILD Born Suffering from the affects of alcohol or drugs Deprived of oxygen In poverty With severe deformities I AM A PRISONER

Injured severely during capture

Or in jail

I WAS AN ACTIVE PERSON

With a bright future When

A life changing injury

A stroke

An acute alcohol or drug overdose

Changed my future and that of my family's

I AM A SENIOR CITIZEN

Whose Family love them But Can not safely or physically care The miracles of modern medicine saved us But our future is in the publics' hands We are forgotten people In health care Even more so once we enter long term care Although we are considered to be a family Every aspect of our lives is Strictly Confidential Even if we go to the hospital We never receive best wishes from our friends in long-term And they receive no up dates on our progress The health care has forgotten us When we enter long term care We lose our identity All we worked for is lost For the young person Their potential may never be known Many have turned to their religion This give them strength and hope

Our need for more CCA'S, nurses, occupational, physio, speech and recreational therapists is critical But most of all our voices MUST BE HEARD Each individual's journey is different But WE ARE COMING HOME





For the month of January 2023, we had a surplus of \$1,630.55 before the fund account revenues and expenses. The balance of the house fund along with funds from the memorial fund were used to pay off the house mortgage on January 12, 2023. There was one final mortgage payment in January that is included in the financial statement as an expense. For 2023, revenues and expenses related to the house

will no longer be included in a separate fund but will be included in budgeted general revenues and expenses.

Audited financial statements for 2022 and a 2023 budget will be included with the 2022 annual report. These documents will be available shortly for you to review for the annual general meeting.

3. Monthly PAD donation

You may request to sign up for a monthly **Pre-Authorized Debit (PAD)** donation. This option allows you to automatically make your donation monthly by allowing the church to debit your account for the donation. Please contact the church office if you would like to take advantage of this giving option.

Please note that you may **donate marketable securities** to the church. This will allow you to eliminate any capital gains taxes and allow you a tax donation credit at the same time. 


Decorate this ALLELUIA. Then hide this paper someplace where you'll remember it on Easter.




- Today is the 1st Sunday in Lent.
