A Different Easter Story

This is for those of you who celebrated Redeemer's Easter Sunday service and heard Pastor Trent's message referencing an unfortunate incident that recently took place at our church. You may be wondering "is there more to this story and did it end well?" Yes and yes!



A purse disappeared from the social hall

while the owner was happily enjoying lunch with her fellow quilters in another room. The 'disappearance' was not noticed until several hours later, and despite a thorough search of the church it remained 'lost'. The only possible explanation was that it had indeed been stolen. But from the church? It didn't seem possible.

I was that quilter and that purse belonged to me. And it is a story about several things. Yes, there was a crime. There was a theft. There was a victim. And there was loss — car and house keys, money, credit cards, car registration and driver license, eye glasses, potential ID. theft. And the phone. If you've ever misplaced your CELL, you know what that is like. All those contacts and all that information stored in something smaller than your hand. There was also loss of sleep.

But it is a story about much more. Mostly it is a story about human goodness. My fellow quilters rushing to look for the lost item and sharing concern when it was not to be found in the building. A fellow quilter who immediately offered to drive me home to get the extra set of keys so I could retrieve my car. The next door neighbor who generously lent me her phone to contact credit card companies, banks and other institutions and notify police. And then, even though that neighbor was extremely busy wrapping up her work week, checking flights for a next day family holiday departure, and driving her son to and from soccer practice, she took time to help with the search. Using the application 'apple find my device', we found the general area of the phone near a Mall where we rooted through dumpsters and garbage cans with no success. My neighbor shared my grief and displayed heartfelt concern and caring.

Then the next day my daughter and I returned to the Mall and received unbelievable help from two young Security Officers. This time we searched inside - more dumpster diving but still no phone. Again, using 'apple find my device' the two young security officers thought to check a locked back room where trash from the previous day had been left for pick up. You

can only imagine the look on my face when they came out carrying my purse, looking only a little scruffy from its time in the trash. Amazingly the only thing missing was a pair of sunglasses. More amazing was the realization that because this was Good Friday, that big bag of trash had not yet been picked up.

Human goodness, yes. But this is also a story about how it feels to be a victim. How often do we, myself included, 'blame the victim'? How could she/he be so stupid? What were they thinking to put themselves in that situation? If I'm being honest, I admit to sometimes being less than empathetic. It was stupid of me to leave my purse so close to the back door, but no one pointed that out. All I got from friends was concern and offers to help. Yes, empathy! For that I shall be forever grateful, and I will remember to be less judgmental about other's misfortune.

It's also a story of 'assumptions' and jumping to conclusions. The thief, I assumed would be a man and that he would quickly throw away the purse after taking its contents. What man wants to be seen with a purse? Better to just take the valuables and run. Get busy maxing out the credit cards. Pocket all the ID to use later. Toss the phone once discovering it is locked and of no use.

As it turned out I was wrong about most of these assumptions. The 'thief' was probably not a man. Although we are not certain, the thief was quite likely a middle aged woman. A woman the Mall security was familiar with, known to them, probably someone with a mental health problem. When she heard the phone ring she probably panicked and threw it in the nearest garbage.

This theft was a crime of opportunity and not very sophisticated. A stranger entered the unlocked church and took the first visible thing of value. Yes, stealing is wrong but life is a bit more complicated, especially for our vulnerable population, the type of person we see every day on our streets, possibly homeless, needing more of our empathy then condemnation. I felt differently about this theft. And it made me think more about other people who are victims, mostly just because life has dealt them a different hand. What can we do to help?

It was not fun to feel vulnerable. No phone, no credit cards, no money. There would be financial cost – I'd have to buy a new phone. Replacing the car fob would be expensive. But I knew it wouldn't be a huge cost. I could go to the bank in a couple of days and new credit cards would soon arrive. At most this was a big inconvenience. There was some loss but I still had so much to be thankful for. For some people, this is not so.

Having the purse returned intact was indeed more than I ever expected. I felt like the woman in the Parable of the Lost Coin who searches for her lost coin, and when finding it, rejoices and quickly goes to tell her friends so that they can rejoice with her. For me this parable of loss means Redemption, and God continuing to search and to work with and through people to bring that about. It's a different Easter story, but it's a wonderful Easter lesson. Thanks be to God.

Ron Litzenberger The following is taken from an interview **Kate Bowler**, a Canadian academic and associate professor of the history of Christianity in North America at Duke Divinity School had with **John Swinton**, a professor of practical theology and pastoral care at the University of Aberdeen in Scotland, and the founding director of Aberdeen's Centre for Spirituality, Health, and Disability. He worked as a nurse for sixteen years within the

John: So then to be a disciple is to become a friend of Jesus. The church becomes a community of friends. But then you look at the friendships of Jesus and they're really different. Like, so my Facebook friends, of whom I have many (I can prove it with screenshots). The problem with Facebook friends is you can get rid of them very easily. And most of your Facebook friends are very similar to yourself. So you've got this lovely cluster of people that just look like you. It's like looking in the mirror and we can do that in real life as well. The thing that's startling about the friendships of Jesus is that they are not marked by the principle "like attracts like," but by the principles of grace that like attracts those people unlike you. So tax collectors, sinners, prostitutes. Not reformed, tax collectors, sinners, and prostitutes who are just doing the thing. And it's through that friendship that they begin to encounter who Jesus is. And I think that's the heart of belong. Recognizing that we are as a church, a community of the friends of Jesus and that Christ-like friendship doesn't look like the kind of friendships we're used to. And that's the radical edge, I think, in principle that we have to offer to the world in terms of belonging, because people really can find a space through that kind of relationship

Kate: When that when you describe that kind of unlikeness and the way that it forces us to belong to each other. I'm thinking of my friend Roger, who passed away last month. He was the librarian here at the divinity school, and Roger and I didn't have that much in common. He was a librarian and liked being a librarian. I liked running around talking about American religion, and we had very little to chat about, except that Roger showed up for every small act of picking me up from the airport when I needed to go to the hospital, making sure the sign-up sheet for food that I didn't say that I needed, but definitely needed, was filled in. And the unlikeness that became the most stable part of a very unstable time is I couldn't have gotten that if I hadn't been part of a church that was committed to me in a way that like a guy at the grocery store was never going to be committed to me. He like, made some kind of weird covenantal promise at the beginning of time to actually care about my stupid problems. Like when we belong to each other. It's a lot of work. It's sort of horrible.

John: But there is great power in small things, isn't there? Like, I think that transformation and change isn't necessarily a huge thing. We're not called to transform the world. That's God's job. But we are called to transform ourselves. And often times transformation comes through these small gestures of hope that enable us to find belonging. I think that's a great example.



Count how many of each symbol you see. Which symbol has seven?




They became one big Christian family.
