The Unseen King

Pilgrim is a musical based on The Pilgrim's Progress, an allegory of the life of a believer in Jesus. In the story, all the unseen forces of the spiritual world are made visible to the audience. The character of the King, representing God, is present onstage for almost the entire show. He's dressed in white and actively blocks attacks from the enemy, tenderly holds those who are in pain, and nudges others to good works. Despite his indispensable role, the main human character can't physically see the King, only the effects of what he does.

Do we live as if the true King is active in our lives, even when we can't physically see Him? In a time of need, the prophet Daniel received a vision from a heavenly messenger (Daniel 10:7) who'd been sent in direct response to his faithful prayers. The messenger explained that spiritual warfare had delayed his coming and angelic backup had to be dispatched (v.13). Daniel was reminded that even though he couldn't see God, he was surrounded by evidence of HIS care and attention. "Do not be afraid you are highly esteemed"" the messenger encouraged him (v.19). At the end of Pil-grim, when the main character reaches heaven's door after many tribulations, he joyfully cries out for the first time, "I can see the King!"

Until we see Him with our new eyes in heaven, we look for His action in our lives today.



1. Mail to or drop off a cheque at the church

2. Interac E-Transfer using online banking

We are set up for automatic deposit. If you use online banking, you may make a payment to Redeemer Lutheran Church by:

3. Monthly PAD donation

You may request to sign up for a monthly Pre-Authorized Debit (PAD) donation. This option allows you to automatically make your donation monthly by allowing the church to debit your account for your donation. Please contact the church office if you would like to take advantage of this giving option.

Please note that you may also donate marketable securities to the church. This will allow you to eliminate any capital gains taxes and allow you a tax donation credit at the same time.

How do we approach someone who is grieving or going through difficult times? The first step can be the hardest and most awkward. If our words in greeting aren't right then it can either doom a caring relationship right from the start or set a relationship off on the wrong foot. Starting with a simple "Hello" is often a great start. But what happens next? It is important to connect meaningfully.

The following excerpt is from the book <u>Don't Sing Songs to a Heavy Heart</u> by Kenneth Haugk

"...Here are some words almost magical in their effect. "It's great to see you." Just that. You were expecting something more profound? These words seem so simple, but they are profound in their effect. They have great power. They break the ice and connect you meaningfully with the other in an instant. Provided they're true of course---that in your heart you truly find it "good to see" the other person.

So far, you've said "Hello" and "It's good to see you". What's next? Your next move may not be words at all. It could be touch. How much touch depends on your relationship with the other person and what both of you are comfortable with. You may do no more than reach out to touch the other person's arm or shoulder or you may gather your friend into a warm hug.

So far, so good. You haven't sung any songs to the heavy-hearted one. You've greeted your friend, shared what is in your heart, and possibly touched him or her.

And if your friend still hasn't said anything? This isn't very likely because of how you have eased into the situation, but it could be so. More likely, the other individual has started to talk or maybe is shedding a tear. This is good. A great way to continue—and an almost surefire invitation to get the individual talking –is to say, "Fill me in on what's been happening?" or "Bring me up to date" or whatever other words you decide to use. Maybe you've noticed the "How are you?" isn't included here. This question is not totally off limits, but it often is not the best way to open a conversation, especially not the first time you visit with someone who is suffering. The immediate, unvoiced, internal response to *How are you?* could be *How do you think I am!*

Keep it simple. "Hello" "It's good to see you" Possibly a touch. "Fill me in on what's been happening". Hurting people usually want to talk about their life situations. They will seize the opportunity to do so when given a chance. Your immediate goal is simply getting them to talk about what is concerning them right at that moment. That will be enough, if you allow it to happen. You don't have to think up perfect formula answers to questions. You don't have to theologize or psychologize or sing away the other's heavy heart. You couldn't do it anyway.

Sometime, probably earlier than later, it makes sense to say "I'm sorry" or "I'm so sorry you are having to go through this." Sharing your sorrow is another powerful act. Your sorrow connects with the other's sorrow. For that moment, at least, you have stepped in to share the burden and lighten the load of the suffering individual.

One of the most effective and caring ways for you to invite the other person to open up is for you to do just the opposite. Be quiet. Listen! Listening much more than talking leads to success in caring."
